ONNOISSEURS will argue about the proper size (in microns) of the hand-ground pigment in their custom paints, but most people just pick up the Benjamin Moore. Somewhere in between are the commercial luxury paints, like C2 Paints of Buffalo or FINE PAINTS OF EUROPE, which offers formulations from Schreuder, a Dutch company that makes paint for Martha Stewart's premium line. The high-pigment Schreuder enamels (far right) can make a door look "like the fender on a Mercedes," said John Lahey, founder of the company. A kit with materials to paint that door is \$75, including delivery; specialized brushes, center right, cost \$24 to \$80; www.finepaints.com or (800) 332-1556. The brush shaped like a hockey stick (\$19.69) and the five-inch Bison brush, bottom left, (\$26.79) are both from Janovic Plaza, the New York-based chain.

FARROW & BALL has headquarters in Dorset, England, and a new showroom in New York, at 979 Third Avenue. Here are dead-flat oils (\$75 a gallon, plus shipping) in such traditional shades as Arsenic, Pigeon, Mouse's Back (a

gray) and the now famous Dead Salmon, seen in the Farrow & Ball can above; (888) 511-1121 or www.farrow-ball.com.

Agnes Emery, the Belgian architect, stocks modern milk paints (a blend of casein and acrylic), satisfying the discerning traditionalists who congregate at her Paris shop, EMERY & CIE. Chips of its 81 subtle colors are available by mail (\$17); 2.2-pound cans of paint (\$16.90) cover 75 square feet; 29 Faubourg St.-Antoine (011) 33-1-44-87-02-02.

Old fences and outbuildings might welcome Simulated Whitewash No. 1600, available from **OLD VILLAGE PAINT** of Fort Washington, Pa., for \$47.95 a gallon; (610) 238-9001.

The American colorist Donald Kaufman sells precisely formulated Color Concentrate pigment (\$30 to \$41), which can be added to a gallon of base paint. Premixed liquid gallons from the **DONALD KAUFMAN COLOR COLLECTION** are \$57.45 to \$81.95, depending on shade and finish,

through the Color Factory in Englewood, N.J.; (201) 568-2226.

Do-it-yourselfers buy raw pigments, above left, at places like GUERRA PAINT & PIGMENT, 510 East 13th Street (Avenue A); (212) 529-0628. A four-ounce bottle of liquid pigment — enough to permanently alter a gallon of Benjamin Moore base — costs \$6 to \$22. The store's powdered pigments can tint stucco or cement for an integral finish. Half-pound containers of pigment are \$3.50 to \$30, for cobalt violet blue.

For small projects around the house, there are lush spray paints in 130 high-opacity sophisticated colors favored by graffiti artists, including Black Turquoise, Plum Gray and Lobster. Aerosol cans (400 milliliters) of paint are \$6 from BELTON MOLOTOW PREMIUM, a German supplier; www
